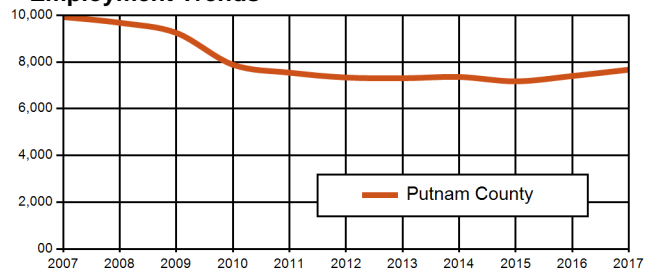

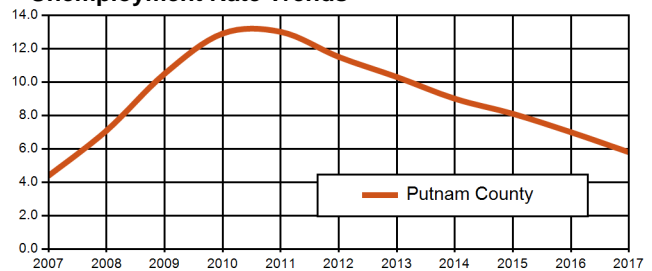

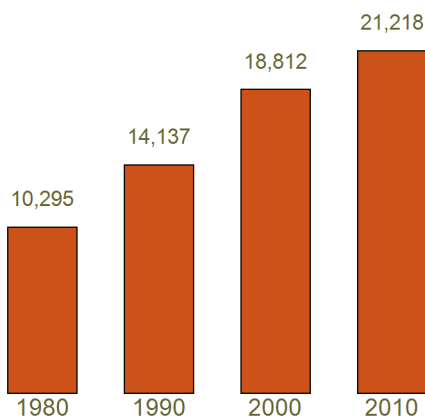
### Employment Trends

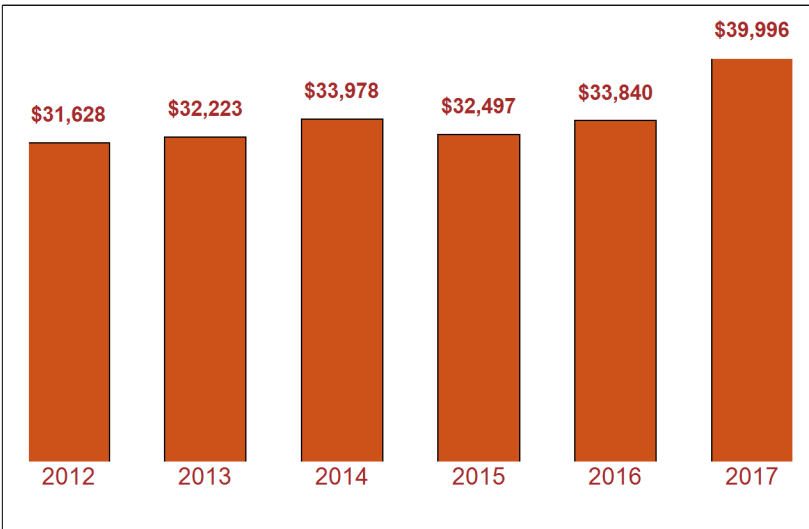

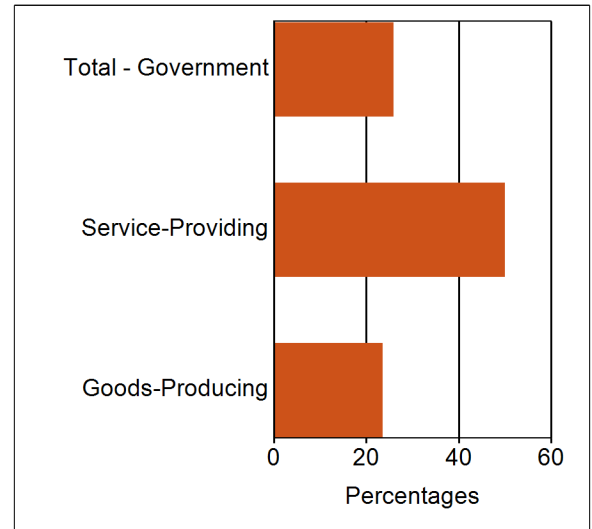
## Putnam Per Capita Income
